## Rev.Elations

As I stepped outside my Roswell, New Mexico motel room this morning the sunrise had transformed the cloud-specked eastern sky into a beautiful patchwork of orange and gold. Trina, Kyle, Sasha and I are now on our way home after an eventful trip that included five book-related events, six days at our annual General Assembly in Salt Lake City and some sight-seeing at Santa Fe, Taos, Carlsbad and (ahem!) the one-and-only Flying Saucer Museum and Research Center here in Roswell.

Those who are truly curious can ask us about the latter, but the true purpose of this “road report” is to share just a few highlights of what proved to be a very eventful General Assembly.

The spirited and unusually cordial campaigns of the two candidates for president of the UUA provided much of the week’s excitement. Dozens of partisans in either gold or turquoise T-shirts roamed the broad avenues of the convention center button-holing delegates to solicit votes for either Peter Morales or Laurel Hallman. Both office seekers made final passionate public appeals for support and pamphlets and broadsheets were freely circulated among the uncommitted. The contest appeared to be so evenly matched that few observers were willing to speculate about the outcome. Ultimately, however, Peter Morales of Golden, Colorado was elected by a decisive margin – the UUA’s first Latino President.

Having known both Morales and Hallman for many years, I felt confident that either would perform credibly in the president’s role. Nevertheless, having formally endorsed Peter many months ago, I took considerable pleasure in the results.

Though momentous, the presidential election wasn’t the only important item on the GA agenda. A proposal to introduce significant changes in our denominational Purposes and Principles went down to defeat in one of the closest Plenary Session votes I’ve ever witnessed. As Unitarian Universalists, we are required to revisit and review this portion of the Association’s By-Laws every so often to determine whether it still accurately reflects the current state of our knowledge and captures our identity. The process helps insure that our Purposes and Principles remains a flexible statement of “things commonly believed among us” and is not construed as an unalterable, doctrinaire creed.

“Standing on the Side of Love” emerged as one of the most prominent themes of this year’s General Assembly. An outgrowth of the tragic shootings at the Knoxville, Tennessee UU Church last year, this initiative underscored our intention as Unitarian Universalists to fully embrace an ethic of love and to steadfastly oppose the forces of intolerance, suspicion and hate in our world. As an expression of this ideal, GA attendees rallied in support of immigration reform and in solidarity with the Utah LGBT community.

Many other inspirational and informative events accompanied General Assembly. For Trina and me, one exceptional highlight was the final worship service on Sunday morning, where Abhi Jamananchi, a close friend and former assistant minister at FUS, delivered a stirring sermon before four thousand listeners.

Although only a handful of Madison UUs made the long trek to Salt Lake City last month, next year Minneapolis plays host to this annual continental gathering of the UU clan. I guarantee that even a couple of days among legions of religious liberals will deepen your understanding of and heighten your appreciation for our unique and powerful movement.

## FUS Legacy Circle Members: Stan and Shirley Inhorn

In 2006, Stanley and Shirley Inhorn created a legacy gift for the First Unitarian Society. Max Gaebler had presided at their marriage in the Meeting House in August, 1954. The year 2009 marks 50 years of their membership in the Society.

Upon graduation from the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Columbia University, Stan had come to Madison

in July, 1953 to complete a medical internship prior to a residency in the U.W. Department of Pathology. After a six-year stint in the clinical chemistry laboratory at the University of Iowa Hospital, Shirley had arrived in Madison in September, 1953 for graduate study in the U.W. Department of Physiological Chemistry. They met in the cafeteria of the UW Hospital in January 1954.

Although the cultural differences of their formative years might have been insurmountable, they recognized that music and science were mutual interests. Stan played violin in his Cleveland Heights, OH high school orchestra and in college orchestral and chamber groups, and sang in a men's glee club during his medical school days. Shirley played the piano and the marimba. "The marimba was something of a novelty in rural Iowa in the early 1940s, and I was much in demand as a soloist." They both majored in chemistry in college.

Although they were initially attracted to the striking architecture of Frank Lloyd Wright's design for the Meeting House, they quickly realized that the content of the services reinforced attitudes they had developed through the years. "I like the

freedom to explore religious pathways," Stan commented. A religion that values reason appeals to them. "Tolerance for diverse views is important to us," Shirley added. "We are challenged to consider how to deal ethically with contemporary issues." The excellence of the music program also inspires them. The continuity provided by Max Gaebler and Michael Schuler has strengthened their commitment to the Society.

The Inhorns have contributed to FUS in various ways. When their three children were middle and high school students, Stan formed the Inhorn Family String Quartet, which performed occasionally for weekly services. Stan served as Financial Trustee on the FUS Board; more recently, he was chair of the Financial Stewardship Council. When their children were students in the Sunday church school program, Shirley was a teacher; she also served a term as hospitality chairman. A long-time tour guide for Friends of the Meeting House, Shirley is presently coordinating that activity for the tenth year, and serves on the committee that oversees preservation of the historic Meeting House. Stan and Shirley have solicited funds for annual campaigns and for the recent capital campaign. They are frequent ushers for church services. "Through participation in numerous activities, we have created lasting friendships," Shirley added.

The richness of their religious experience and the desire to assure the continued growth of a liberal religious tradition in the Madison area prompted them to create the legacy gift. "Our goal is to strengthen the FUS Foundation and assure the continued vitality of the First Unitarian Society in this community." ●

The Economic Justice Committee at FUS is moving forward with planning for participation in the Second Chance Family program. This program invests time and resources in a homeless family. The goal is to help them develop the skills and resources to escape the cycle of homelessness. We are developing a work plan that organizes our efforts. We need your help in making this a success. First, we are recruiting mentors to work closely with the family, coaching them to success. I'm leading this effort because I was a mentor in the past and truly understand its importance and what it will take to succeed.

In addition, we will need to furnish the apartment. We need everything from beds and couches to pots and pans. Erin Slattengren ([eslattengren\(at\)sbcglobal.net](mailto:eslattengren(at)sbcglobal.net)) is coordinating this effort and is maintaining a list of what is needed and what we have. You can imagine what is needed to furnish an apartment for a family. You probably have some of this that needs a new home. This is your opportunity to give that used, but still functional furniture a second chance and feel good about it.

We are NOT collecting the stuff yet, so don't bring it to church. Just call or email Erin and let her know what you want to donate. We plan to have a day when small items may be dropped off at church and loaded directly into a truck. We will need a crew to help with our move-in day, likely happening in mid-to-late August. Please let Joan Burns know if you want to be on our moving crew list – your help will be greatly appreciated.

## Ecotip 142

### Congress and Climate Change

The House of Representatives passed the Waxman-Markey bill to force the energy industry to reduce carbon emissions. Keep three important things in mind as you work to see this legislation improved and signed into law.

1. The risk of major shifts in eco-systems is above 95%. Action taken now will ameliorate damages in the future that will decrease life expectancy, cost major building to forestall damage from sea level rise, and will threaten the global availability of food.
2. Climate change will cost everyone. Costs for air conditioning, remediation – after floods, hurricanes, and tornadoes, and all forms of transportation will rise. No action this year is more costly than some action.
3. Immediate action is needed. Waiting for the “best” technology will be more expensive than doing what we know we can do now.

USA enacting greenhouse gas reducing measures will give some credibility to our leadership world-wide. We may be called upon to share our resources with poor countries around the world in order to have a global reduction in the problem.

Actions FUS can undertake to deal with this problem are being discussed by the Environmental Action Committee. Join us in August to help deal with this problem.
